



Seasons Greetings from the Cookie Cutters

Another year is winding up. They say time flies when you are having fun, I must have had a blast this past year! It has gone by so quickly.

If your New Year's resolution is to volunteer at the Seniors Centre, please consider joining our baking group. Our bakers provide baked treats to sell in the kitchen as well as seasonal events such as the Spring and Christmas Teas. This month's recipe is from one of my old Heartsmart recipe books. This is a favourite of mine to make at Christmas. Biscotti keeps so well and is a welcome gift too!

Honey Almond Biscotti

Ingredients

- 2 cups all purpose flour
- 3/4 cup granulated sugar
- 3/4 cup almonds, finely ground
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- 3/4 cup whole unblanched almonds
- 1/3 cup honey
- 1/3 cup water

Method

Combine flour, sugar ground almonds, baking powder, baking soda, cinnamon and whole almonds. Stir together well.

Add honey and water. Stir until stiff dough forms.



Divide dough in half. Roll each half into log about 15 inches long.

Line baking sheet with parchment paper. Place logs, well, apart, on paper. Bake in preheated 350° F oven for about 30 minutes, until well risen, firm and golden.

Cool logs slightly and place on cutting board. Cut, on a diagonal, into 1/2 inches long slices. Return to baking sheet and bake for an additional 15 minutes until dry and lightly golden.
